No presentations this evening.

Items for Discussion:

Larry Finch spoke about the potential rezoning of the property located at the northeast corner of Darrow Road and Glenwood. Mr. Finch stated that the city has attempted to rezone this property in the past to a R-5 Residential Cluster District. The property is currently partially in a PF (Public Facilities) District and also a PUD (Plan Unit Development) District. There is no use for the PF and the PUD is part of a remnant the originally Ethan's Green project. This has been presented to Planning Commission and the decision has been split due there being only four people at meetings while this was on the agenda.

This area is about 19 acres in size and will permit up to 68 units on the property. Could generate \$1 million in revenue to the city. Could allow as much as \$16 million in improvements to the land. Property taxes could generate roughly \$400,000 annually based on 68 units. The school district would be made whole by the property taxes of \$275,000 of annual revenue with approximately 30 additional students as cluster units do not traditionally contribute very many students per unit. Household incomes currently average north of \$69,000 annually although not all residents will pay the full rate of income tax.

Mr. Furey stated at if council wanted to move this forward that we would need a Public Hearing. Mr. Finch stated rezoning requires three readings and a Public Hearing. Mr. Furey stated he thinks this is what this land was supposed to be and that it would butt up to two other Ethan's Green condo associations. He stated that Ms. McFearin has stated that there is a shortage of single story homes in this area.

Mrs. Stauffer asked if we needed to run this past Planning Commission since there is new members. Mr. Finch stated the same members are on the board as when this was presented.

Mr. Steele stated that the conceptual drawing that did not stub into current drive. Mr. Finch stated that was a very generic example of what could be placed there. Mr. Steele stated that if this goes through that whatever money the city makes on this gets put on the clubhouse debt. Mr. Furey stated that this option was discussed in the past and he would be in favor of it also. Mr. Scaffide stated he thought it was a good idea also.

Resolution 37-2019 – Enter CRA with Pepperl+Fuchs, Inc. and P+F Realty, Inc.

Mr. Finch stated this will allow for \$9.7 million in payroll, \$194,000 in income tax, roughly unabated \$400,000 in property tax/\$200,000 after annually for 12 years.

Mr. Steele asked if we will get the entire \$194,000. Mr. Finch stated that the schools will get approximately 8% of this. Mr. Furey stated that is our standard agreement with the schools.

Mr. Steele asked if this was part of a job sharing agreement. Mr. Finch stated he will look into it.

Ordinance 46-2019 - Dedication of Shepard Preserve Subdivision

Ms. Mohr stated the roads were in before winter and that is will release the bond.

Resolution 47-2019 - Enter into agreement with Ohio Performance Team of the State Auditor's Office

Mrs. Buccigross stated that this agreement will get the performance audit done citywide.

Ordinance 48-2019 - Appropriations Amendment to decrease Fire Travel and Training

Mrs. Buccigross stated that this will reduce the Fire Travel and Training per the request of the Finance Committee.

Ordinance 49-2019 - Appropriations Amendment for Liberty Park Baseball Field

Mrs. Buccigross stated this is just moving the grant money from one account for accounting purposes.

Miscellaneous:

Mr. Steele stated that he will be presenting a motion to approve a transfer of ownership for a liquor permit during the regular council meeting.

Mr. Furey gave his recommendations on how to categorize the boards and commission based on the number of meetings each has. He would like to see these incorporated into the Council Rules.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

Sherriff Steve Barry – Summit County Sherriff Office

Sherriff Barry stated on May 22nd they received a call for a missing autistic, non-verbal 2 year old. Assistance was requested and the City of Twinsburg responded as part of the county-wide teams. The child was found in a car in the neighbor's garage. He wanted to thank Chief Morgan as well as Chief Noga. He stated he works very well that our departments and our safety forces are second to none and wanted to thank them personally.

Mr. Thewes spoke about the low turn-out at the polls last week for the school levy renewal. He would hope for more from our residents and the city should too.

Shelia Williams

Ms. Williams reported on Summit County Public Health. Their building sold and \$1.4 million from the sale will be put on the new debt of the Fairway Center and the storm water problems they are having.

She talked about SCPH's budget and how they did not ask for an increase this year and they service all municipalities in the county. Their budget is between \$29-35 million of that \$17 million is contributed from the municipalities the rest is grant money. She also stated statistics show that opioid deaths are down but addiction is up. This is still a real problem.

Ms. Williams also spoke about the about the HOA and how yards look. Some condo units are renting more and with rentals brings another problem. You have people who don't feel they need to pull permits and don't have to follow the rules. She stated she loves the Building Department but we need to do more to enforce our codes. Who should be called when this happens?

Mr. Furey stated that her case may be a little more complicated due to the condo and home owner associations then the Building Department should be the first point of contact.

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS:

Chris Campbell – Public Works Director

- **Roadway Maintenance** – During the months of April and May to date a total of 943 pot holes were patched, bringing the season total to 3,217. Areas patched included: Chamberlin Rd, Ravenna Rd. and the industrial area. Approximately 75% of the city has been patched since March.
- Road berm repairs were performed on Darrow Rd just north of the community gardens.
- **Animal Control** – Crews removed 7 dead animals from the streets. We will continue to work with A & S Animal Control for trapping etc.
- **Storm Area Checks** – The collection areas were cleaned on twice in April due to the heavy rain fall.
- **Microturbine** – The Wastewater department's microturbine continues to run well
- **Sewer System Repairs** – Performed a sanitary system repair on Wilcox Dr. to correct a problem area.
- **Branch Chipping** – The May chipping to date has included 498 stops with 207.5 cu yd of material collected. This round should be finished later in the week.
 - Next Round** – The next round of chipping will begin on Monday, June 3
- **Litter Removal** – A second trip through the city has been completed.
- **Street Sweeping** – The initial trip through the city began on May 8th with approximately 75% of the streets completed; 29.25 cu yd of debris has been removed.
- **Miscellaneous Work** –
 - Shelter upgrades at the golf course have begun

-Flag pole installation at Fire Station #2 have been completed
-Assisted with the Earth Day set-up

- **Seasonal Employees** – All seasonal hires should begin work during the first two weeks in June which will speed up our grass cutting efforts

Mr. Scaffide asked if CUE bid out their salt contract yet. Mr. Campbell stated yes and the results were around \$71, however ODOT is the group the city will be going with.

Chris Noga – Police Chief

- During the month of April the City of Twinsburg Communications Center generated 2,319 calls for service among the Twinsburg Police and Fire Departments and the Reminderville Police and Fire Departments. The total call count for the year is 9,753. The Village of Reminderville accounted for 194 calls in April with a total of 849 calls in 2019 through April 30th.
- Twinsburg police officers arrested and/or cited 116 suspects into court on 180 different counts. The arrest counts include: (2) counts of Menacing by stalking, (28) Drug related charges, (3) Liquor possession/Open container charges, (21) for Driving under suspension or without a valid license, (22) Operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs of abuse charges, (1) Domestic violence charge, (7) Warrants served, (1) count of Interference with custody, (1) count of Obstructing official business (1) count of Grand theft vehicle. The remaining charges were various other criminal or traffic related charges.
- Twinsburg officers issued 169 written warnings and 3 parking citations.
- Officers investigated 39 traffic crashes of which 8 were injury crashes, 10 were on private property, and none were fatal.
- Reminder Ravenna Road will be closed on Memorial Day for the duration of the parade which steps off at 10:00am. The road should be open back up around 10:30-10:45am

Mr. Scaffide asked Chief Noga to relay the statistics from speeders on Glenwood. Chief Noga stated that the digital speed signs are out and are being moved throughout the city. When the sign was on Glenwood for nine days the average speed was around 28 mph. The signs are about 85% affective in slowing people down. Some of the times there were higher speeds can be correlated to emergency response vehicles.

Mrs. Stauffer policing in the second roundabout during the construction. Chief Noga stated they continue to patrol this area but it is hard to sit somewhere because it is so narrow but officers will continue to run patrols through that area.

Timothy Morgan – Fire Chief

Call Volume

- The fire department ran a total of 255 calls this April, for the year that is 952 calls, which down 2% compared to last year.

Notable Events

- Event #19-8416, 4/12 @ 12:43: Called to the intersection of Darrow and E. Aurora Rds., for an unresponsive female. Crews responded to find TPD Officers performing CPR and defibrillation to a 52 year old female, in the middle of the road. FD personnel assumed care for the patient and continued ACLS efforts while transporting to CCF Twinsburg, during which time the patient had

several rhythm changes. The crew assisted ED personnel and a spontaneous pulse and respirations were obtained.

Fire Prevention

- Inspected 13 locations and 3 fire investigations.

Training

- There were 8 hours of Public Education totally about 80 personal contacts
- Department logged 106 training events which was approximately 411 hours of training.

Notable Events

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Points of Interest

- Weather Warning Sirens: May's monthly test of the system was conducted on the 4th, and all sirens functioned properly, except for anomalies at the Cannon Rd./Liberty Rd. site and the Ravenna Rd. site in the Township.
- BWC Grant: 1 Extractor and 1 Drying Cabinet installed and operational at Station #2, and 1 Extractor installed and operational at Station #1. Total project cost of \$21,240, BWC contribution of \$12,118.
- Hydrant Flushing: The annual hydrant flushing process has commenced, and will continue until all the hydrants in the City and Township, almost 1,900, have been taken care of. This process helps keep the hydrants in good working order for firefighting operations, but it also flushes large amounts of sediment from the system. TFD would ask that you be patient with the process and remember, if you find cloudy water in your home after we have worked in the area, to simply allow the water to run until it clears up. Also, please be careful when passing our crews working at the sides of the streets, and be cautious of the potential for momentary flows of water as we complete the process at each hydrant.
- Employee Death: On April 11th Firefighter/Medic Demetrius Butler killed his finance and then himself while off duty. Demetrius was a valued member of our department and displayed great competence, great compassion, and great potential. The Fire Department is terribly saddened by his loss, and by the pain and heartbreak he caused in his departure. The FD wants to thank the community, the City Administration, Council, and other City employees for their words and gestures of care and concern of the last several weeks, it has been truly appreciated.

Larry Finch – Community Economic Development Director

Legislation

- Resolution 37-2019 A resolution granting the Mayor the authority to enter into a CRA Tax Abatement Agreement related to the relocation of Pepperl-Fuchs to the City of Twinsburg. Pepperl-Fuchs is an international electronics technology company with their main offices in Twinsburg Twp. The company wishes to move their corporate offices to a Darrow Road site just north of the CVS Drug store at the southern end of the City. They will bring a \$9.7 million payroll and invest approximately \$25 million in land and building improvements and furnishings. The proposed abatement would provide 50% tax abatement for 12 years.

Planning & Development

- We anticipate providing a draft Downtown Redevelopment Plan proposal to Council at the next meeting and will be asking Council to refer the matter to Planning Commission for comments prior to any action. A number of issues will need to be clarified after P.C. review including the composition of a management authority (DRD Board/TIRC/ or other). Efforts will be needed to present the draft to the public and to identify efforts to inform and involve property owners and businesses in the district. Legislation will be required to establish the public purpose and establish each district's boundaries, goals and investment plan.
- NOPEC Energized community Grant – we have investigated various types of E.V. charging stations and identified a number of possible locations for the installation of car charging stations. We are currently working with vendors to clarify costs and scope of the effort.
- CDBG Grant for senior center sidewalks – this grant application was submitted last fall and has finally been approved by Summit County. The City has bid the project was waiting for the grant agreement with the county to be completed. With the completion of the grant agreement we will be able to begin reconstruction of the sidewalks.
- Vistar expansion – Vistar will begin the expansion of their Twinsburg facility in the next 60 days. The 78,000 s.f. addition's site plan has been approved by Planning Commission and should receive Council confirmation to night.
- A 71 unit R-7 site plan is being proposed to Planning Commission at their May 20th meeting. This will be a revised plan with fewer units than the 130 apartments in a three-story structure that was proposed previously.
- Glenwood/Darrow re-zoning proposal – PUD and PF existing zoning is proposed to be re-zoned to R-5 Residential cluster zoning. Approximately 68 units would be possible. These units could generate more than \$16 million in new property value paying property taxes in excess of \$400,000 annually. Few children would be contributed by cluster residential units which traditional appeal to empty nesters. As the site is within the existing roadway and utility network of the City servicing the new units would require minimal additional City expense.

TCIC

- A date for the next meeting has yet to be set. The last meeting failed to field a quorum so no official action was taken. We will announce the next meeting date and time at Council's next meeting.

Sarah Buccigross – Finance Director

- May 2019 Income tax receipts total \$2,487,711.61 compared to May 2018 receipts in the amount of \$3,125,066.51. This reflects a decrease of 20.39% or \$637,354.90 compared to last year.
- 2019 YTD income tax receipts total \$9,708,346.98 compared to 2018 in the amount of \$10,486,215.81. This reflects a decrease of 7.42% or \$777,868.83 compared to last year.
- The 2019 Income Tax Revenue Budget was based on a 1.25% increase from 2017 collections. 2017 YTD income tax receipts totaled \$9,206,823.72. This reflects an increase of 5.45% or \$501,523.26 compared to 2017.
- Refunds in the amount of \$39,414.37 are included in the May collections.
- The net change in distribution for this month for individual, net profit and withholder collectively is: \$345,817.30.

Mayor Yates stated that there is an opening on the Civil Service Commission along with a Teen Representative for our Environmental Commission.
