Items for Discussion:

Fitness Center Memberships

Derek Schroder, Parks & Recreation Director, discussed the option of allowing city based businesses to get Fitness Center memberships at resident rates. He stated he brought this up at a prior meeting and also sent an email.

Council stated they did not have an issue with this.

Holiday Lights

Derek Schroder stated that the city met with a contractor to look at this along with Rock the House. The thought would be to get more permanent lighting that could be used year-round and for other holidays or events. Mr. Schroder stated they are working to be able to compare apples to apples. They are looking at an option of slightly used equipment. Ordering and getting things in place will be tight this year.

Mr. Bellan asked what the timeline in a non-Covid year looks like. Mr. Schroder stated that when it is rented it comes pre-programmed and set up a day or two before.

They mayor stated the city electrician looked at a couple different ways of doing the project. Possibly temporary placement for the holidays and then coming back in the Spring to set them permanently.

Mr. Schroder stated this is not landscape lighting which is dim, this will be more event lighting that is brighter and more impactful. He will hopefully be able to send out quotes soon.

Delineators

Ms. McFearin stated she brought this up because she saw the Service Department out repairing these again. She said it seems as soon as they get repaired they get knocked back down. She stated this an ongoing cost and the city is constantly reviewing ways to save money.

Mr. Bellan stated that the numbers provide on how often the city is fixing the five different locations with 96 repairs this year. Mr. Furey stated the ones on SR91 by the concrete plant are always being hit. Mr. Bellan stated that he believes before he was on council that there were resident complaints. Mayor Yates stated that as developments went in around the tracks there were more complaints. There was a grant that helped cover some of the costs of the crossings for the arms and part of that was the delineators needing to be put in. He stated creating the Quiet Zone was a lengthy process.

Mr. Scaffide stated it was a costly process. He believes it needs to be thought out before the city considers removing the delineators.

Mrs. Stauffer asked Ms. Mohr, the City Engineer if she could elaborate on this.

Mr. Scaffide said we have a Quiet Zone but the cities around us do not. He stated he can hear those train whistles.

Ms. Mohr stated the gates were part of a safety program. When the city did the gates paid for by the state on two sites. In order to make it a Quiet Zone the city had to place the delineators to prevent cars from going around the gates. If maintenance on the delineators is not done the railroad will begin to blow the whistles again.

The mayor agrees that we need to evaluate this further.

Ms. McFearin thought Twinsburg was only one of three communities with a Quiet Zone.

Mr. Furey asked if there is a different type of delineator that is sturdier. Ms. Mohr stated we can look at different option but need to consider how narrow the road is at some of the locations.

Mr. Barr asked if we can set up cameras and charge back those knocking them down. Mayor stated there was some monitoring done in the past at some locations.

Ms. Mohr stated whatever is put up needs to be breakaway material. She reiterated that some sites are too narrow to consider some other options. There are other ways of doing it but there are costs associated with that. Mr. Furey suggested doing something different at one location and monitoring it. Mrs. Stauffer agreed. Mr. Bellan stated the city has spent the most on replacement (over the five years) at the Cannon Road location. Mr. Bellan stated we have paid double the original cost on the

maintenance since these were put in. He asked that council be provided other options and their costs to review. The mayor said they can work on that.

No further items for discussion this evening.

Audience Participation:

Bruce Baldwin -3310 Cannon Road

Mr. Baldwin stated there are vacant buildings in town. He thinks it looks bad for a business or family looking to move to Twinsburg. He asked what is being done with the property where the two houses were torn down near McDonald's. Mayor stated those are owned by the CIC. There are current conversations with potential developers for reinvestment in that area. Mr. Baldwin stated the properties could have been left to provide taxes to the city.

Mr. Baldwin mentioned his signs needing to be moved and then removed. He stated when he came to city to get them they were not at the Police station but at the Building Department.

No further audience participations this evening.

Pending Legislation:

Ordinance 74-2020 - Authorize LPA Agreement for Richmond-Broadway-Shepard-Ravenna Intersection Reconstruction Project

Ms. Mohr stated this is the agreement for the Richmond-Broadway-Shepard-Ravenna Intersection. This is to accept money and enter into agreement with ODOT.

Mr. Bellan stated the total is \$ 2,738,576.00.

Ordinance 75-2020 - Repealing Ordinance 47-2020

Mayor Yates stated this is the repealing of Ordinance 47-2020.

Ordinance 78-2020 – Appropriations Amendment for reduce revenue estimates and operating

Mrs. Buccigross stated Ordinance 78-2020, 85-2020 and 86-2020 are all appropriations amendments. 78-2020 is on second reading with an emergency because this needs to be sent to Summit County. This is the revenue and operating adjustment.

Mrs. Buccigross stated Ordinance 85-2020 one is just a budget correction and the other is about the Timothy Lane project. The Land and Development portion is two parcels that were applied for from the Summit County Land Bank in 2016 that just came through. The Capital Fire is the lease financing where if the city does three years instead of five there is 0% interest.

Mrs. Buccigross stated it should be the third and final round of Local Coronavirus Relief Fund. It is estimated at \$680,000. She stated this is from the state.

Ordinance 81-2020 – Approval of auction list

Mr. Campbell stated this is the ordinance to authorize the auction items. This includes everything that all departments had along with a lot of vehicles. Mr. Bellan asked how this list compares to previous years. Mr. Campbell stated there is a lot of vehicles but overall the list is not that big. When the city got away from the live auction and switched to the GovDeals we do one to two auctions a year and have been able to stay ahead of things.

Resolution 82-2020 – Approval of Conditional Use Permit for Campopiano Roofing

Mr. Maistros stated this is requesting council's confirmation of the Planning Commission's recommendation for conditional use permit for outside storage. Mr. Scaffide added that he reported on this at the last meeting.

Ordinance 83-2020 – Accept quote from United Survey for Timothy Lane Storm Sewer

Ms. Mohr stated that this is for an emergency repair for a storm sewer on Timothy Lane. She is looking to do the emergency repair on the first section of the pipe and put the remaining project in the program. This would be United Survey and hoping to get done by the end of the year.

Mrs. Stauffer asked how many phases are involved with replacing these pipes. Ms. Mohr stated she is working on a plan to encompass this. In this particular area there are other obstacles so not sure but will work on the plan this winter.

Resolution 84-2020 – Authorize Agreement for 2020 CDBG Program

Ms. Mohr stated this is for the mayor to enter into the agreement for the automatic doors at the Fitness Center. This will have to go out to bid because it has federal funds attached to the project.

Ordinance 85-2020 – Appropriations Amendment for various items

Ordinance 86-2020 - Appropriations Amendment for Local Coronavirus Relief Fund

Resolution 87-2020 - Appointing members to the Special Committee Declaring Racism a Public Health Crisis

Mr. Bellan stated this is appointing the members to the Special Committee Declaring Racism a Public Health Crisis.

Mr. Scaffide stated he wanted to express his disappointment that Ward 1 did not have any representation on the committee. Out of the seven appointments none are from Ward 1. There were three applicants from Ward 1. Each of the other wards are represented. He understands it was not set up to be ward specific but the city has always tried to do things equally.

Mr. Scaffide stated we need to come up with a consistent way to interview and appoint members to the boards and commissions.

Mr. Bellan stated that this one was not Ward specific. He agrees council needs to come up consistent way. As council always are, they have been fortunate to have great candidates to choose from.

Mrs. Walker stated council could consider someone as At-Large or someone in reserves.

Mrs. Stauffer stated she struggled with a list because they were all good candidates. If it is not ward specific it is hard.

Mr. Scaffide stated that there were five that turned in their list from one to seven. Each person should have got their number one choose. Then the mayor could have picked the others. Mr. Scaffide stated the mayor is allowed to vote on boards and commissions.

Mr. Furey stated they interviewed eleven of the thirteen who applied (others could not make interviews) and sent in their selections. He thinks the city got seven outstanding members.

Mr. Scaffide said he thought all candidates were outstanding. He just doesn't feel it is a fair representation across the city. He is not going to sit by and watch candidates from his ward be passed by. A more fair way would have been to have each person's first choose put on the board.

Miscellaneous:

Mr. Scaffide asked if the railroad tracks on Route 82 near Cannon are in the city's jurisdiction because they are in bad condition. Ms. Mohr stated she has met with the railroad representatives because there were two accidents near tracks in Twinsburg which triggers and inspection of the railroad. The railroad is in the review process. The city has agreed to provide the maintenance of traffic through the Service Department and the resurfacing near the tracks through the Road Program. By the city being willing to assist it could help move them up on the list to get it done sooner.

Mayor Yates commented that there were so many good candidates for the Special Committee on Racism. He is proud of the city and all the people who came out that we are being proactive to look at what is happening around us. He stated that night he voiced his opinion but was not sure if he was voting. He encourages all candidates and council consider attending these open meetings.

No further miscellaneous this evening.

AWARDS & PRESENTATIONS:

Mayor Yates presented Jeff Cole with Community Focus (formerly Cable 9) with a proclamation for his years for coverage for the city of Twinsburg.

Jeff Cole thanked Twinsburg for the proclamation and for being able to receive it in person. He also thanked Anthony Perici, Jim Karabec and Kathi Procop and Mayor Yates. Thanked the citizens of Twinsburg. Stated he will miss everyone come election time when they would normally do the interviews.

AUDIENCE PARTICIPATION:

Karen Clinton – 2045 Glenwood Drive

Mrs. Clinton stated she is deeply saddened and disappointed that the charter states the mayor shall be the chief conservator of the peace. She stated that because of Issue 24 the city has become divided. As a resident and former dispatcher and firefighter. She stated the residents will never stand down when it comes to police, fire and service departments. The way it is being presented as for police and fire is outrageous. Issue 24 is about the resident's right to vote. She made a records request for the letters of intent from the unions that backed Issue 24. She asked how the mayor can campaign against this issue.

Sheila Williams – Cobblestone

Ms. Williams stated Summit County Public Health (SCPH) has done some drive through COVID testing. There were over 1,000 tests administered and approximately 65 test positive. SCPH has received about \$2 million from the county and \$1.4 million is being used for testing. \$367,000 in CARES Act funding being used for contact tracing. A lot of the money has to be used by the end of the year. She also shared one of the members received a Game Changer award for her efforts.

Ms. Williams stated and few other updates were the Tobacco 21 fees have been removed. There are some staff that have not returned and others that have been reassigned.

Ms. Williams spoke as a resident. She wanted to mention that she hopes the city has plan in place for election for those who may want to disrupt the election. In regards to the Metro Parks annexation, will the city still maintain and retain the rights to the active recreation (ballfields etc.)? As the Metro Parks do the annexation will the residents be able to voice their opinion on the matter? What exactly are they annexing?

Ms. Williams stated she agrees with same that each ward should be represented. The purpose is to be all inclusive. She congratulated those who are being appointed. She hopes to come to some of the meetings to hear what is going on and looks forward to what comes out of the committee.

No further public participation this evening.

The mayor stated the annexation will be for the passive areas that they currently maintain and control. The active recreational area the city will still maintain and control. There will not be much different in what is currently happening.

Mayor Yates commented on Mrs. Clinton's comments. He agrees there is currently some division going on in the community. This issue is an important issue. He stated that the police, fire and service employees wanted to help get information out. It is a challenging issue. There are only a few options for revenue which are inside millage, voted millage or income tax. He stated it's like a three legged table. You can balance it but once you cut of one of the legs and put something on top it will fall over.

- Road Maintenance – Sept / Oct Totals – Patched 14 Pot Holes, Used 2 Tons of Asphalt/Cold Patch, and asphalt hot mix
 - Season Totals – Patched 1228 Holes, Used 19 Tons of Asphalt/Cold Patch
- Animal Control – Crews removed 10 dead animals from the streets.
 - Total Animals Removed from Roadways to Date - 103
 - We will continue to work with A & S Animal Control for trapping etc.
- Storm Area Checks – The collection areas were cleaned once in September, and once in October with the removal of approximately 100 Lbs. of debris.
 - Totals to date – 9 checks performed, 525.25 Lbs. of debris removed.
- Microturbine – The Wastewater department’s microturbine continues to run well

Call Volume

- The fire department ran a total of 222 calls for the month of September. 2,134 calls for 2020 which down 3% compared to last year.

Fire Prevention

- Inspected 125 locations and 4 fire investigations.

Training

- The Public Education is currently suspended due to COVID-19. However there were 3 drive by visits.
- Department logged 124 training events which was approximately 668 hours of training.

Notable Events

- Event #20591 & 20655, 9/12 & 9/13 @ 14:13: Called for a Dive Team response to Lake Milton in Mahoning County for a missing person. FF Derrick Kulcsar responded with the Summit County Water Rescue Team and completed 6 dives and other support operations during 18 hours of operations over two days. The non-swimming victim, not wearing a life jacket, had fallen from a rented kayak and submerged around 12:30 on the 12th, in spite of the rescue attempts of a fellow kayaker. The Summit County Team was summoned to complete a body recovery. The team completed sonar operations and multiple dives on targets, as well as search patterns on the 12th with no success, but "clearing" large portions of the area where the victim was last seen. The operations were suspended due to darkness and plans were made to continue the operation the next morning. On the 13th the team resumed the operations at 09:00, and ultimately discovered the body at approximately 15:30, overcoming the poor visibility, changing currents, debris, and submerged

topography that is common in man-made reservoirs. FF Kulcsar represented TFD well throughout the operation, and performed well, and we appreciate his dedication.

Points of Interest

- Weather Warning Sirens: October's monthly test of the system was conducted on the 3rd, most sites functioned properly, the exception being the Bavaria Rd site that totally failed and the Liberty/Cannon Rds. site that functioned properly, but the indicator light did not illuminate.
- Fleet: Med 2 is out of service and needs an engine replacement. Fred Bissell is working on arrangements with the chassis manufacturer for assistance since it is a known problem with that specific engine model.
- COVID-19 Operations:
 - General: Still maintaining adequate PPE supply, including disbursements from SNS and donations from local businesses and individuals. Chief Morgan and Bosso regularly participating in conference calls with Summit County agencies. TFD has experienced no illness of personnel and so far only one member's family has been impacted, to this point.
- Projects in Process:
 - Replacement windows in the second story of Station #1 - NOPEC Grant.
 - In process, 2 remaining windows on order.
- Replacement Bay doors on the front of Station #1 - NOPEC Grant.
 - Doors are on order.
- Staffing:
 - Fulltime Staffing: Craig Moledor was sworn-in on 9/28, to fill an opening created by a retirement.
 - Part Time Staffing: No Change.
 - Current Staffing: (as of 10/1)
 - 30 Fulltime (1 on light duty due to on-duty injury)(+1)
 - 11 Part-time (2 on extended Leave)
 - 1 Fulltime Executive Assistant
 - 0 Part-time Secretary (Laid-off)

Mayor Yates mentioned the Moody's call. This was a call with the bond rating analyst who then reports to a group who then decides where the city's bond rating will fall. A lot of topics are discussed to help decide the outcome. Thanked Sarah Buccigross for all she did to prepare for this.

Sarah Buccigross – Finance Director

2019 Audit Release

- The 2019 audit of the City's annual financials and the City's first Comprehensive Annual Financial Report has been released and is available on the City's website as well as the Ohio Auditor of State's site.

2020 Budget Adjustments

- Three appropriation amendments have been presented to Council for passage this evening. The largest of which is the revenue and operating expense adjustment for 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The other two amendments include additional Coronavirus Relief funding, budget corrections, and funding for three capital projects.

2021 Budget Process

- The Regional Income Tax Agency is currently working on a model to determine the revenue impact of workers continuing to work from home on a more permanent basis. This estimate will help Twinsburg to plan for the loss of employer withholding against the potential gain in residents working from home. The loss/gain estimate will be very helpful in budgeting for 2021 income tax revenues.

September Close

- Finance is working on the September close and the financials will be available online once completed.

COVID-19 Relief Funds

- Additional Funds have been approved for distribution to the new Local Coronavirus Relief Fund in the estimated amount of \$679,490. Total funds received to date are: \$402,888.45. Council passed Ordinance 79-2020 to establish the use of the funding in the Local Coronavirus Relief Fund.

COVID-19 Relief Funds (continued)

- An agreement was signed and submitted to the County to participate in the payroll relief program. The City has accepted \$542,945.62 in relief funding that has been used to offset payroll expenses for Dispatch, Police, and Fire.
- COVID-19 relief funds received earlier this year related to the EMS services that the City provides have been used by the Fire Department for their costs incurred related to the global pandemic.
- Finance has attended and will continue to attend all available conference calls, webinars, and trainings regarding the COVID-19 relief funding and the necessary documentation to comply with Single Audit standards, and OBM, AOS, and Treasury guidelines.

Summit County Metro Parks Annexation

- Lisa King, Executive Director of the Summit Metro Parks, provided the City with an update on their annexation process. The probate court hearing is scheduled for October 22, 2020 at 1:30pm.

Bond Issuance

- The process to issue the \$7,138,000 Recreational Facilities Improvement Bonds, Series 2020 (Gleneagles Clubhouse) continues. A bond rating call with Moody's was held on October 9th and the results from that call are expected later this month.
